Subject: Petition to Convert Four Mile Creek to a Municipal Drain

Recommendation

That Council not approve the petition for drainage works provided by Mr. Robert Duchesne to convert Four Mile Creek into a municipal drain.

Background

In December of 2018, the City of North Bay received a letter from Mr. Robert Duchesne, a property owner living on Four Mile Lake, indicating his intent to petition to convert Four Mile Creek to a municipal drain under the Drainage Act. Four Mile Creek is the outlet for Four Mile Lake and beavers periodically build a dam at the mouth of the creek which creates an impact on the water level of the lake (i.e. the water level would rise). Mr. Duchesne stated that he is concerned about rising water levels impacting his property (dock, water well, etc.). Schedule A provides a map showing the lake, creek, and private property at the outlet of the lake.

Four Mile Creek is predominantly located on private property. In his letter, Mr. Duchesne stated that he did approach the land owner where the beaver dam is located, requesting that the land owner break the dam but his request was denied.

In the subsequent time period, the City Engineering Department had multiple discussions with Mr. Duchesne with respect to the proper form for the petition as required by the Drainage Act. For a petition to be considered, the Drainage Act requires that it be made by a majority of owners in the area or by the owners of at least 60% of the hectarage in the area, and that the petition be submitted to the City Clerk using the prescribed form "Petition for Drainage Works by Owners Form 1". Mr. Duchesne was advised of the above and was

requested to provide further documentation.

On October 21st, 2021, the City's Clerk office received a formal petition from Mr. Duchesne and other land owners within the vicinity of Four Mile Lake. Schedule B provides a copy of the letter, Form 1, and petition. The Drainage Act requires that once a petition has been filed with the municipality, it shall be considered by the council within thirty days after the filing (November 20th, 2021). City staff reviewed the documentation provided by Mr. Duchesne and determined that the petition may not be complete in terms of the requirements under the Drainage Act in that page 2 of Form 1 may need to be completed by every petitioner.

Financial/Legal Implications

Legal Implications

Under Section 5 of the Drainage Act, City Council is obligated to consider a petition for a new drainage works that has been filed with the clerk of the municipality within thirty days after the filing of the petition, and to make a decision as to whether or not to proceed with the drainage works for the area of land that requires drainage as described in the petition.

Should Council decide to proceed with the drainage works, Section 8 of the Drainage Act requires that it shall subsequently appoint a drainage engineer. The engineer is required to determine the petition's validity in terms of compliance with the requirements of the Act. Further to this, the engineer is also required to examine the area requiring drainage as described in the petition and to prepare a report which shall include a description of the area that the engineer determines requires drainage, an estimate of the total cost of the drainage works, and the proportion of the total cost to be assessed to each parcel of land within the drainage area.

A person who is prescribed by regulations and who has received notice of the petition under section 5(1)(b) may, within thirty days after receiving the notice, send to the council of the initiating municipality a notice that an environmental appraisal of the effects of the drainage works on the area is required. The costs of an environmental appraisal required shall be paid by the person who sends the notice requiring it.

If Council decides not to proceed with the drainage works the City is required to send notice of its decision to the prescribed persons. Any petitioner may appeal to the Tribunal and the Tribunal may direct Council to take such action under the Drainage Act as the Tribunal considers proper, including directing Council to proceed with the drainage works and appoint a drainage engineer to prepare a report.

Financial Implications

Should Council proceed with the petition, the City will be responsible for the appointed engineer's fees. A portion of these fees will be recovered from the petitioners and future maintenance costs will be attributed to the petitioners based on the future assessment schedule outlined in the engineer's report. The City may also be included in the assessment schedule should the engineer determine that the City would also benefit from the drainage works.

Options Analysis

The proposed drainage works of the petition do not appear to affect municipally owned infrastructure. Approving the petition could incur long-term operation costs and liabilities by the municipality. Other options by the petitioners could be explored including resuming negotiations with the property owner where the beaver dam is located or requesting further assistance from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry.

Staff's investigation included review of the Drainage Act and consultation with other jurisdictions, the North Bay-Mattawa Conservation Authority and other City Departments (Public Works, Legal and Clerks). The Conservation Authority suggested that there may other opportunities for beaver management and that should the drainage works be approved, a permit may be required by them to undertake work within a waterbody. Public Works was not supportive of the petition for the reasons stated in the above paragraph.

Option 1:

That Council not approve the petition for drainage works provided by Mr. Robert Duchesne to convert Four Mile Creek into a municipal drain.

Option 2:

That Council approve the petition brought forward and continue with the process outlined under the Drainage Act to convert Four Mile Creek into a Municipal Drain.

Option 3:

Request that the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry review the beaver dam matter and potentially resolve the issue.

Recommended Option

Option 1 is the recommended option.

That Council not approve the petition for drainage works provided by Mr. Robert Duchesne to convert Four Mile Creek into a municipal drain.

PETITION TO ASK THE CITY OF NORTH BAY COUNCIL TO RECLASSIFY FOUR MILE LAKE TO A MUNICIPAL DRAIN as per SECTION 4 OF THE DRAINAGE ACT OF ONTARIO

TO THE MUNICIPALITY OF NORTH BAY, ONTARIO

October 20, 2021

The lake level of 4 MILE LAKE is controlled by a four-foot-wide creek at the north eastern limit of the lake, which is the sole drain for the whole lake and surrounding area. Now and then beavers build a dam on this 4-foot-wide creek, and by such raise the lake level.

When the water level is raised too high, damage can be done to all the landowners surrounding the lake: wells, docks, lawns, water in basements, etc....

The beavers usually build their dam on 4-mile creek in a very short parcel of privately owned land (maybe 50 feet) at the outflow of the lake. This landowner sometimes refused to break the dam to properly control the lake level.

This petition is for the City of North Bay to reclassify 4-mile creek from a private ditch to a municipal drain as per section 4 of the DRAINAGE ACT OF ONTARIO. NO WORK AND NO COSTS ARE INVOLVED.

By doing so the City of North Bay would be allowed legally to go onto this private land and break this 4foot-wide dam to control the water level of 4-MILE LAKE thereby saving possible damages to all the landowners around the lake. Accompanied is the signed petition by the majority of these other landowners around Four Mile LAKE.

4-mile creek is also a long drain which runs along 4-mile road to highway 63 and finally dumps into TROUT LAKE. Therefore, it drains a large area. The City of North Bay should be in control of this important drain.
