Recommendation

That Council authorizes the City Clerk to amend the Waste Management By-Law 2019-108 pursuant to the recommendations noted in Report to Council IO - 2022-006.

Background

This repot has been prepared for the purpose of adjusting the Waste Management By-Law No. 2010-108 to include service levels for large multi-residential buildings.

The Waste Management By-Law No. 2010-108 provides waste collection service levels for multi-residential buildings. Multi-residential buildings with 9 units or less have curbside waste collection services. Multi-residential buildings with 10 units or greater have container collection services. The By-Law provides a service level for multi-residential buildings based on the number of units in the building. The current service levels for multi-residential building with 10 units or more are as follows:

Collection from any multi-residential building having 10 to 20 dwelling units shall consist of 1 lift per week of one 4 cubic yard container.

Collection from any multi-residential building having 21 to 50 dwelling units shall consist of 1 lift per week of one 6 cubic yard container.

Collection from any multi-residential building having 51 to 75 dwelling units shall consist of 2 lifts per week of one 6 cubic yard container.

Collection from any multi-residential building having more than 75 dwelling

units shall consist of 3 lifts per week of one 6 cubic yard container.

Based on the current By-Law a very large multi-residential building with hundreds of dwellings would have the same waste collection service level as a building with 76 dwellings.

It is recommended that additional service levels be included in the Waste Management By-Law No. 2010-108 to include larger multi-residential buildings as follows:

Collection from any multi-residential building having 76 to 125 units shall consist of 3 lifts per week of one 6 cubic yard container.

Collection from any multi-residential building having 126 to 175 units shall consist of 4 lifts per week of one 6 cubic yard container.

Collection from any multi-residential building having more than 176 units shall consist of 5 lifts per week of one 6 cubic yard container.

This amendment would ensure that very large multi-residential buildings have equitable waste collection service. Also, as the City of North Bay grows and larger multi-residential buildings are constructed it will be critical to ensure that reasonable waste collection services for these larger buildings is provided.

Financial/Legal Implications

The environmental services staff completed a review of the existing multiresidential buildings in the City of North Bay and 4 properties were identified as being impacted by the proposed amendment. Their waste collection service level would be increased by 6 cubic yards per week. Using the unit rates in the current contract this service level change would increase the existing waste collection contract by \$88.72 per week in 2022. If this change was implemented July 1, 2022 this would equate to and additional \$2,306.72 for the 2022 fiscal year.

There are sufficient funds in the existing 2022 environmental services budget to cover these additional costs. Future costs associated with this service level change will be incorporated into future environmental services operating budgets.
